



A few years ago in the month of May I participated in a silent, spiritual retreat on the side of a mountain in Nelson County, Virginia. It was during this week that I was introduced to a meditative practice called *Otium Sanctum*, which is Latin for *Holy Leisure*. *Otium Sanctum* is a spiritual discipline highlighted by early Church Fathers where a worshipper of God turns attention away from external influences and distractions of his or her day and places complete focus upon God. Prayer, meditation upon scripture, and the appreciation of natural surroundings are a few of the ways people practice Holy Leisure. On the week-long retreat I attended, we observed silence 20 hours a day, fasted from telephones,

computers, televisions, and the like, and tried to temporarily break with the routine of our hectic lives. We learned that people committed to spiritual disciplines often refer to *Holy Leisure* as the opposite of measuring success by what is produced and quantified. Instead, attention is given to seeking balance in our life, the ability to be at peace with our self and others throughout the day, while taking time to enjoy the beauty of God's creation in our midst. Our focus shifted from being driven by a calendar or clock, which is reflective of *chronological time management*, and rested instead on the *opportune time* of our worship. A goal of our week in the woods was to rest sufficiently enough to then experience the spirit of God in a more full and contemplative way. As a result, we opened our self to the spirit of God without the restrictions often imposed by calendars and clocks, loud, insistent voices, and the need to rush from deadline to deadline. We breathed deeply and we waited patiently. Yes, God is in control, and we can trust to allow our lives a few moments of rest from our responsibilities and ambitions.

I want to encourage us to explore *Otium Sanctium* more often in our lives. Jesus did, often retreating for prayer and renewal, as documented throughout the Gospels. The point is to worship more freely; not bound by the need to rush toward another agenda item, but rather posture ourselves to let God's agenda be realized more fully within our lives. Currently, we might be tempted to meet for worship with one eye upon the Lord and another upon the clock. What if we decide to make time – opportune time – for unhurried, holy leisure? For example, what if we adopt the principles of *Holy Leisure* as a worship theme and emphasize times of worship without fixed agendas and order? Awkward? Yes. To invest ourselves fully while simultaneously loosening the reigns attached to the outcome is in itself a discipline. However, a new, more desired result can emerge; the result of growing deeper in our spirits while allowing the spirit of God to guide us in our time management. So . . . I share some food for thought as we continue to seek

the discernment of God and administer within the Body of Jesus Christ. First, set aside time (chronological), for time (opportune) allowing God to re-create within us. Second, allow understanding of our self and our world to develop and mature. Third, recognize that we will be changed, growing closer and more full of God's holiness within us.



#### **Church Notes**




